WHAT ACCESS 2 DOES IN KAMPONG SPEU

ACCESS 2 works in Kampong Speu to improve access to coordinated and inclusive services for survivors of gender-based violence (GBV) and persons with disabilities. Australian support reaches all three of the program's workstreams, with the provincial Physical Rehabilitation Centre supported alongside GBV response and disability inclusion.

The Provincial Coordination Committee brings sub-national authorities and implementing partners together to plan, share data and solve problems, while the Provincial Disability Action Council and GBV Response Working Groups drive local implementation. Partners support GBV counselling rooms, referral pathways and awareness campaigns that reach communities across the province's districts.

Services continue to deepen. Speech therapy has been established at the provincial referral hospital, preparations are under way for a One Stop Service Unit for GBV Survivors and Organisations of Persons with Disabilities are shaping more accessible public services.

ACTIVITY HIGHLIGHTS IN KAMPONG SPEU

Gender-Based Violence



- Supporting a new One Stop Service Unit for GBV Survivors at the provincial referral hospital
- Supporting eight GBV Response Working Groups (1 provincial, 7 district) and training 698 members on counselling, referral and legal protection standards
- Establishing confidential GBV counselling rooms in nine communes across four districts.

Disability Inclusion



- Supporting disability identification (23,420 people identified and 19,327 disability cards issued)
- Strengthening the 59-member Provincial Disability Action Council, including ten Organisations of Persons with Disabilities
- Supporting accessibility audits by disability organisations, prompting communes to fund accessible facilities

Rehabilitation



- Supporting the Kampong Speu Physical Rehabilitation Centre
- Launching speech therapy services at the provincial referral hospital through a Communication and Language Support Room
- Training 12 community health workers and four hospital staff in speech therapy skills



ACCESS 2 has transformed service delivery for persons with disabilities and survivors of gender-based violence by strengthening coordination, ownership among government institutions and local partners, and integrated referral pathways. As a result, vulnerable individuals can access essential services more easily and receive timely, respectful, and survivor-centred support that upholds their rights, dignity, and resilience.
